Summer Reading Suggestions

Below are some names of authors and titles of books your child might enjoy reading over the break. **These are simply suggestions.** Of course, we are happy for your child to read for leisure and pleasure so cartoons, non-fiction, poetry, joke books (puns, play on words), magazines are all fine too!

Fiction

1. **"Charlotte's Web" by E.B. White, illustrated by Garth Williams**
 - The heartwarming tale of friendship between a pig named Wilbur and a spider named Charlotte.
2. **"The Miraculous Journey of Edward Tulane" by Kate DiCamillo**
 - Follow the journey of a porcelain rabbit as he learns about love, loss, and hope.
3. **"The Wild Robot" by Peter Brown**
 - The adventures of a robot named Roz who wakes up on a remote island and must learn to survive in the wild.
4. **"Stella Díaz Has Something to Say" by Angela Dominguez**
 - A charming story about a shy Mexican-American girl finding her voice and overcoming her fears.
5. **"Ghost" by Jason Reynolds**
 - The story of a young boy named Castle "Ghost" Cranshaw who finds his way into a track team and discovers his potential.
6. **"El Deafo" by Cece Bell**
 - A graphic novel memoir about Cece's hearing loss and her journey to find acceptance and friendship.

7. **"Aru Shah and the End of Time" by Roshani Chokshi**
 - An adventurous tale inspired by Hindu mythology, featuring a young girl named Aru who must stop the God of Destruction from ending time.
8. **"The Penderwicks" by Jeanne Birdsall**
 - The story of four sisters who spend a magical summer on the estate of Arundel and discover the joys and challenges of family and friendship.
9. **"The Phantom Tollbooth" by Norton Juster, illustrated by Jules Feiffer**
 - An imaginative adventure of a boy named Milo who discovers a magical tollbooth that transports him to a whimsical world.
10. **"The BFG" by Roald Dahl, illustrated by Quentin Blake**
 - The enchanting story of a young girl named Sophie and her adventures with the Big Friendly Giant.

Non-fiction

1. **"Who Was Nelson Mandela?" by Pam Pollack and Meg Belviso, illustrated by Stephen Marchesi**
 - A biography of Nelson Mandela, exploring his life, struggles, and legacy.
2. **"Hidden Figures: The True Story of Four Black Women and the Space Race" by Margot Lee Shetterly, illustrated by Laura Freeman**
 - The inspiring story of four African American women mathematicians who played crucial roles at NASA.
3. **"The Boy Who Harnessed the Wind" by William Kamkwamba and Bryan Mealer, illustrated by Elizabeth Zunon**
 - The true story of a Malawian boy who built a windmill to save his village from famine.
4. **"She Persisted: 13 American Women Who Changed the World" by Chelsea Clinton, illustrated by Alexandra Boiger**
 - Profiles of thirteen American women who overcame obstacles and made significant contributions to society.
5. **"The Watcher: Jane Goodall's Life with the Chimps" by Jeanette Winter**
 - A beautifully illustrated biography of Jane Goodall and her groundbreaking work with chimpanzees.
